This year's Annual Meeting will include several activities beyond the Scientific Sessions for your enjoyment. He completed his General Surgery internship and his Orthopaedic Surgery residency at Bowman Gray - Wake Forest University School of Medicine/North Carolina Baptist Hospital, and completed a fellowship in Pediatric Orthopaedic Surgery at the Children's Hospital of Boston. Dr. Mooney is currently Professor of Orthopaedic Surgery and Chief, Division of Pediatric Orthopaedic Surgery at the Medical University of South Carolina. Dr. Mooney has numerous publications in his specialty of Pediatric Orthopaedic Surgery, including research on pediatric spinal deformity; pediatric fractures; and hip, knee, foot, and hand abnormalities. The Saturday Scientific Session includes your choice of "Hand/Upper Extremity" or "Joint" breakout sessions. Optional Golf and Tennis Outings are planned for Saturday afternoon; golf will be on Kiawah's Turtle Point Course. This year's Saturday evening Reception and Dinner will be a casual, family-friendly event, featuring the presentation of the Honored Surgeon Award and a DJ who will involve the crowd in fun activities. Preregistration is required for each of these activities; fees are noted on the registration form. Sunday will conclude the meeting with our final Scientific Session including subspecialty updates, and the presentation of resident paper awards.
