the Professional Context

Resolution 5-2014 - Transparency in Patient Communication and Apology in the Professional Context was introduced at the 2014 Annual Meeting of the House of Delegates by The Greater Greensboro Society of Medicine.

The Resolution called for the NCMS to adopt the following:

RESOLVED, That the North Carolina Medical Society work to amend the language of NCGS 8C-1 article 4, rule 413 to provide that all statements, affirmations, gestures, activities, or conduct expressing benevolence, regret, apology, sympathy, commiseration, condolence, compassion, mistake, error or a general sense of benevolence that are made by a physician to the patient, to a relative of the patient or to a representative of the patient, shall be inadmissible as evidence and shall not constitute an admission of liability or an admission against interest *(action)*.

The House of Delegates voted to refer the Resolution to the Board of Directors for <u>study and report back</u>. The NCMS Board of Directors referred Resolution 4-2014 to the Legislative Cabinet.

The Legislative Cabinet's discussion centered on the balance between the political landscape and the necessity of such a change as is proposed in this resolution. Many of the Cabinet members shared a belief that this was a push too far. A change of this degree of detail to the current NC apology statute would draw a great deal of attention to all of the changes successfully put in place in 2011. The limited impact of the apology statute did not outweigh the protection of the broader package of reforms that have led to a massive change in the tort environment for North Carolina since passage. The Cabinet thought it best to continue to study the changing political landscape to anticipate a future opportunity to address this specific change requested.

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That Resolution 5-2014 - Transparency in Patient Communication and Apology in the Professional Context be further studied for report back.
