Fall is upon us and I hope that the change in seasons will allow you to slow down and practice some selfcare. The pandemic is still with us and your practice is still adjusting to the new work flows that the pandemic and Medicaid Transformation has created but I hope that your work day stressors are easing.

Your leadership team continues to monitor the work in Washington, DC and Raleigh as our elected officials craft bills and budgets that impact our professional lives.

We requested feedback from you in our last newsletter and the results are: **83.3%** of respondents believe that NCOGS is equally both an **advocacy organization** and an **education organization**.

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"Go-live" occurred on July 1st for the Standard Plans and the awards have been issued for the Tailored Plans which will go-live July 1, 2022. Your practice will need to contract with the Tailored Plan that covers your region so review the information on the Medicaid Transformation website to stay abreast of the upcoming changes. You may feel overwhelmed by the large amount of information, but NCDHHS has compiled some comprehensive resources for you. Community Care of NC has also compiled an excellent resource targeted specifically at obstetrical providers. [CCNC OBSTETRICS June 2021 CCNC PMH Practice Communication](#) has contact information for all of the health plans and more. Please share this resource widely with your office staff members.

Medicaid is meeting with the Maternal Health Advisory Group each quarter to hear concerns from the field. This group has replaced the voice of the OB Champion Group and has representatives from patients and families, all disciplines that provide maternal health and all types of practice settings. To assist Medicaid providers with the transition, the NC Medical Society has set up a [Medicaid Transformation webpage](#). This site provides valuable information and also an [online form](#) to share challenges encountered in the transition to the new Medicaid system. If you run into issues, you are encouraged to first reach out to the respective Medicaid managed care plan(s) to seek answers and

solutions. Each plan has set up a process to help both providers and beneficiaries. The NCMS will be aggregating all the submissions it receives and will also be following up with the Medicaid program to resolve any system issues. _____



Advocacy Update

As the North Carolina General Assembly approaches the last weeks of a very long session, lawmakers have made important progress on a number of priority issues for the NC OB/Gyn Society.

Legislators completed their approval of [HB608 Dignity for Women Who Are Incarcerated](#) earlier this month. As you may recall, this legislation is a top priority of our Society. The bill provides important protections – [including a prohibition on restraints](#) – for pregnant incarcerated people in both state and local prisons and jails. A big thank you to all the lawmakers who supported this legislation, including Rep. Kristin Baker of Cabarrus County, Sen. Amy Galey of Alamance and Guilford Counties, Rep. Ashton Wheeler Clemmons of Guilford County and Rep. Donna White of Johnston County.

The Society also welcomed the passage of [HB96 Allow Pharmacists to Administer Injectable Drugs](#). Among other provisions, this bill increases access to contraceptives by allowing pharmacists to provide self-administered oral or transdermal contraceptives to women without a prescription. The provisions regarding contraceptives in this bill are consistent with [ACOG policy](#) recommendations aimed at improving access to contraceptives nationally.

As of this writing, the fate of one of the Society's other priorities – Medicaid expansion – is still unresolved but trending in the right direction. Legislators appear to be poised to [expand eligibility for pregnant women](#) one-year post partum as part of their ongoing process for developing the state's biennial budget. Prospects for expanding Medicaid beyond that - to the more than 500,000 uninsured in North Carolina - are still being discussed in budget negotiations between Gov. Cooper, who must sign the budget for it to become law, and legislators in both the Senate and the House.

Finally, while the effort to end physician supervision for all Advanced Practice Registered Nurses appears to be stalled for the remainder of the 2021 session, supporters of that change got an important boost when Blue Cross Blue Shield of North Carolina sent a [letter](#) to legislative leaders supporting [legislation](#) that would end supervision for all medical specialties. The letter marks the first time the company has weighed in on the issue after years of staying on the sidelines of the debate.

In other news, the Society's lobbyist, Rob Lamme, recently provided a policy update about the 2021 legislature to OB/Gyn grand rounds at Atrium and East Carolina.
